### May Extend City Water To Russell

Possibility of extending the city's water lines to Russell City was voiced by Councilman John Hart at the Monday night council meeting.

Hart asked City Engineer (and newly appointed public works administrator) Hugh Gallager to study the extension extending water lines to Russell City, and asked the cost of extending water to a high point near Mt. Eden.

Hart told the council that a talk with Supervisor George Wright and Walter Connelly, Jackson street pumping station, of a water line to Russell City.

Object of moving the pumping station would be to gain over 12 inch transmission water line. Eventually, Hart would serve 600 acres from Heppner boulevard to the San Bruno Pacific tracks.

Other action taken by the council in a lengthy session before the 50 spectators included: Heard a treasurer's report which showed \$387,270 on hand August 1, as compared to \$507,660 41 on July 1.

Authorized hanging of a banner across Ashland (the coming of a feast).

Referred to the planning commission a request by Harry Carr, 18th street, for a new Broadway.

Accepted an offer by the Hayward Family Producers for purchase of approximately 426 acres of land from the city at \$2.08 per hundred acres.

Ordered Police Chief George G. Smith to investigate parking conditions along lower A street and report his recommendations to the council at its next meeting.

Authorized the hiring of skilled or unskilled laborers by the water department at the pumping station. Skilled laborers will be paid the prevailing union rate.

Ordered the installation of a valve on the Heick-Haley water valve line from the live cross-section line from the Mies reservoir. Permission to connect the reservoir line will be sought in right of way from the city in a steady supply in the event of a temporary halt in Heick-Haley flow.

Authorized the water department to install a 6 inch main line from Jackson in Sacramento street as part of the extension to supply the Mt. Eden district.

Ordered the city engineer to proceed with clearing street improvements as soon as possible.
