Crommelin In Running For Senate

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (AP)—Rep. Alford John G. Crommelin is taking his case against "Pentagon brass and the 96,000 city-paid 'ball crowd'" to the voters of Alabama in the November election. He is seeking election to the United States Senate as an independent candidate in the new general election. He is counting on Republican and State Right Democratic votes in combination with Democratic apathy to give him an unprecedented victory over Sen. Lester Hill, D., Ala.

Observers don't even concede him an outside chance. They figure he will have little more success on the political stump than he has in his running verbal battle over armed forces' unification with military officials in the defense department.

But the 48-year-old naval aviator, who served with distinction during World War II as skipper of the aircraft carrier, is undaunted by the odds. He is returning to the state in a plane of ancient vintage and he is booked solid with civic club and veteran organization engagements.

Discharges EM Hardship Cases Being Considered

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Air Force was thinking today of following the example of the Army, Navy and Marine Corps in considering certain enlisted reservists for discharge on hardship grounds.

But a spokesman said that the Air Force was not yet ready to announce any such plan, but he was calling them in active duty. In all likelihood, said each case probably would be considered on an individual basis.

For example, he said, a man with four dependents probably would not be released if he had a private income from a business or other source.

The Army announced last night it would grant requests for discharges from enlisted men in organized reserves who had at least four dependents—provided they were called in services individually.

It said the practice would not apply to men called in by units to National Guard units or to soldiers serving overseas.

The Navy said all its enlisted men with four or more dependents can ask for inactive duty or discharges.

The Marine Corps said it will discharge upon request enlisted reservists with four or more dependents, but it added:

"The decision is in line with the Marine Corps policy to have a mobile striking force ready to move on short notice in any emergency. To accomplish this with readiness, it must have a reserve of physically fit volunteers who can be called up with a minimum of personal hardship."

The corps also moved to clarify the status of its volunteer reserve officers not yet called to active duty. It said:
