



Kids With Matches Start Fire

ASHLAND — Children playing with matches were blamed for a stubborn fire which broke out at 1:37 p.m. yesterday in a building filled with bales of hay at 16031 Ashland Ave. The fire, visible over much of the surrounding area, was extinguished by 20 firemen and three trucks at 7:46 p.m. last night. Damage to the structure, owned by William J. Rose, was estimated at \$750 by an Ashland Fire Dept. spokesman. Loss of the hay was put at \$125. Firemen returned to the scene at 9:53 p.m. to extinguish a small flare-up in the ruins.

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Air Race Programs Suggested

Hayward Chamber of Commerce sponsorship of a 2011 tournament and charter flight to Las Vegas in connection with the 1966 Hayward Air Race was recommended yesterday by the Chamber's Aviation Commission. In the first two years of the race, the tournament and charter flight were sponsored by the Chamber's Aviation Commission. Airport Commissioner Louis Martinez, who will chair the 1966 race, said city officials favored dropping sponsorship of the companion charter flight to Las Vegas because of the workload and expense. The air race had paid its own way since it was started in Hayward, but the charter flight has been a loss since it was started in Hayward. Tipsy Pupil Pilot Gives Up License

The 36-year-old San Lorenzo student pilot involved in the "Mayday" caper over Hayward Sunday night has voluntarily surrendered his student pilot license, according to Federal Aviation Agency officials. Joe Chapman, operations instructor for the FAA in Oakland, said today that William Endres, 1572 Via Repossa, San Lorenzo, turned in his solo ticket to the FAA. Endres early Sunday evening caused an alert over the Greater Bay Area after broadcasting in a series of Mayday distress calls and then failing to give his identification or acknowledge replies. Radar operators and planes overhead made a futile search for the caller. Long after he was due back at the Hayward Air Terminal on a solo flight in a rented plane, Endres landed at Hayward Airport without landing lights and without the required radio clearance. After being assisted from his plane, he was booked at the Hayward police station on a charge of drunkenness. Witnesses said they found a partially empty liquor flask in the plane. Endres was fined \$22 Monday in Hayward Municipal Court. Chapman said today that several possible charges are being investigated, among them flying while intoxicated, landing without tower clearance, and flying at night without navigation lights.

FUSD Sweats Out Towel Problem

FREMONT — The Fremont Unified School Dist. towel problem may soon be solved to the relief of several staff members who have been racing into Alameda every few days to pick up a fresh batch of clean laundry. District trustees last night agreed to re-advertise for laundry services following a report from Supl. William J. Bolt indicating that the present contract holder could not handle the big operation. Earlier this year, the district awarded a contract for bath towel and laundry services to the El Monte Laundry Co., Concord and Alameda. The firm submitted a low bid of \$1.25 for every 100 towels laundered. This amounts to a year-end total of approximately \$16,000 to \$17,000 per year. This month the firm informed the district it would not be able to continue the contract agreement and requested that the agreement be canceled. Tom Maloney, assistant superintendent of business, told the board last night that the firm was bonded for \$3,200 and that the district should be able to pick up the cost of any damages incurred. He added that the damages would probably not exceed \$3,000. During the interim period, while a new contract is being sought, the district, according to Maloney, has been authorized by the district attorney's office to contract for emergency services with one of the two firms which earlier submitted bids. The district will advertise for three years of laundry service rather than just one year as was the length of the El Monte contract. Supervisors Delay Church Shift Issue

Action on a permit to relocate the True Holiness Church in Christ from Russell City to Kelly Hill in the Hayward area was delayed yesterday by a parliamentary standoff at the Alameda County Board of Supervisors. With only the chairman and one other board member present, Supervisor Robert E. Hanson moved that the petition be granted. He got no second from Supervisor Kent Purcell, and the issue was continued for the presence of the entire board Oct. 28. The church trustees propose to move the church, a 18-year-old structure which many believe helped build, from its present site on Winton Avenue in the Russell City Redevelopment Area to a half-acre lot on the east side of Maud Avenue near its intersection with Kelly Hill. They denied there are other churches conducting services in the area and Planning Director William Fraley confirmed this statement, pointing out, however, that one permit for a church in the area has been granted and another is pending hearing before the planning commission. Mrs. Rose P. Bosc, an Oakland investor who owns the Maud Avenue site, said she is selling it to the church for \$8,000 down and \$65 a month. She urged the supervisors to refer the board ruling. "I have observed the need for spiritual guidance in this area," said E. L. Bassard, 2406 Fairview Ave., a member of the congregation, in support of the church's action. Mrs. Yandy Stroud, 3053 Kelly Hill, charged that the church's enemies are "Joigny Contalates" in the area, who have "shaky financial background" and "would be no asset to the area." Mrs. Norman Bradley, 2926 Hardeman St., charged that the True Holiness church has "no money" and "no church," which bit her Sept. 19 has been vaccinated against rabies. Robert Forbes suggested that wording could be added to make the salute optional "at the discretion of the president." Newman objected that this policy would be "worse than eliminating the salute completely." Mrs. Moran then said it was all right with her, and the policy was approved.
